## Message from the President



Dear Colleagues,

I am in a rather reflective mood as I write this message to you all. I do not recall a time in my life when there have been so many conflicts in the world and the respect for the rule of law has been so challenged or ignored. During my scientific career I have been most fortunate to visit every continent, except Antarctica, and to have had scientific discourse with many colleagues. I know that many of you have also travelled widely and lived overseas.

At a personal level, most people I have met from diverse ethnic backgrounds have had relatively straightforward common goals: to build a successful career, provide for family, stay

healthy and live in peace and harmony with neighbours AND YET the collective societies in which they live can be very different to ours. Democracy is precious and a fragile entity that we cannot take for granted. Demonstrations are not always peaceful. Societies seem to be becoming more polarised as social media and artificial intelligence algorithms replace other forms of more friendly interpersonal communication. There is a sense that more people are becoming marginalised. Governments seem to be less stable, and the influence of the United Nations is but a shadow of what it was in former times. There seems to be increased emphasis on defence spending at the expense of health care, education and maintaining quality infrastructure. That is why organisations like Probus, Rotary and Community Groups are very important.

We are fortunate to have a vibrant, diverse but cohesive club where there is great respect for other members that sustains our caring fellowship. Participating in events beyond our monthly meeting does enable one to get to know other members much better in an informal setting. That is why getaways, coffee and conversation and visits are so valuable. Please participate in some of these activities.

Within ten years Gail was Deputy Principal and then Principal, which position she maintained for thirty years. She loved this role as it allowed her to work in the community and the local parish. She also undertook further studies, firstly a Masters in Educational

Leadership, and subsequently, to build on her work on parent effectiveness, a Masters in Counselling Studies. Nearing retirement, she became a Civil Celebrant and has greatly enjoyed marrying family members.

After retirement she used her background to write a book for parents; *The Primary Years. A Principal's Perspective on raising Happy Kids*. She has also raised funds to support families escaping family violence through her membership and work for the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, Knights Hospitaller. Overall she sees her life as having gravitated around family and social issues.

Bojan Pajic has held several public and private sector management positions and has been a director of several companies and associations.


He is a graduate of the University of Adelaide and former Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

### 2026 Mini Getaway – Cobram RACV Resort

It is proposed to have a mini getaway based at the RACV Cobram Resort from Sunday 15 to Wednesday 18 March 2026. This spacious resort on the edge of Cobram in northern Victoria, about three hours' drive from Melbourne, has a range of quality self-contained cabins available along with apartments and caravan sites. Visitor facilities include camp kitchens, indoor and outdoor swimming pools and an on-site cafe that serves snacks and light meals during the day. Prices for a standard cabin - one queen bed + two single bunks - are quoted 'from' \$98 per night for RACV service members / \$131 for non-members up to \$155 / \$207 per night for a Deluxe cabin with two queen beds and 2 single bunk beds. As has been the tradition for past mini getaways based on cabin style accommodation (or own caravan) the March 2026 event will be loosely structured to enable participants to explore the local region as they are individually inclined or simply relax at the resort itself. A welcoming event on the Sunday evening where participants share self-catered nibbles and drinks in one of the camp kitchens is envisaged along with a self-drive visit to Yarrawonga, possibly including a cruise around Lake Mulwala, on one of the subsequent days. An evening meal together at a

regional restaurant or winery will likely round off planned events. More details will be advised later.

There are things to do and see in the region, including visiting Yarrawonga and the adjacent Lake Mulwala, a 36 km drive away via the Murray Valley Highway, and possibly returning via Mulwala on the NSW side of the Murray River. The Barooga Country Club just across the Murray River from Cobram offers extensive dining options along with a golf course, etc. Meals can also be partaken at hotels in Cobram or self-catered in the cabins or in a camp kitchen with other PPPC participants.

Accommodation bookings will need to be arranged by participants directly with the RACV Cobram Resort. Based on the show of hands at the October meeting, the resort has provisionally reserved twelve cabins (in garden and park areas) in the name of Port Phillip Probus Club subject to a substantial number of firm bookings with payment of a deposit of one night's accommodation by the end of November. (The RACV's normal cancellation policy is up to two days prior to the scheduled arrival.)

Before anyone moves to make a booking, it is requested that they confirm by email message (preferred) or 'phone call to Don McAllister (<a href="domca@bigpond.com">domca@bigpond.com</a>, 0409 967 208) or Miles Pierce (<a href="milwen@ozemail.com.au">milwen@ozemail.com.au</a>, 0429 359 832) their preparedness to do so within the above timeframe by 14 November. Provided that a viable number of such responses are received, the individual respondents will then be given the go-ahead to proceed with making a firm booking.



## Cultural Matters 2: Book Review by Graham Marshall The Years of Lyndon Johnson by Robert Caro (Four Volumes)



Air Force One, The President's plane, is divided, behind the crew's cockpit, into three compartments. In the first of them, just behind the cockpit, women sat weeping and Secret Service agents were trying to hold back tears.......In the rear compartment the widow, her suit stained with blood was sitting next to the coffin of the dead President. And in the centre compartment was the new President.

Thus begins the dramatic opening of the Introduction to Volume 4, *The Passage of Power (2012)* of Robert Caro's mammoth biography of Lyndon Johnson, *The Years of Lyndon Johnson*.

It is November 22, 1963, and this extract marks the transfer of the power of the US Presidency to Lyndon Johnson, after the assassination of John F. Kennedy. It also marks the culmination of Johnson's long and ruthless quest and justifies Caro's 3,388 page, (so far) biography. Commenced in 1974 it still awaits its fifth and final volume, civil rights and Vietnam.

But what a tale he has told to this point. It commences in the early nineteenth century as it covers Johnson's forebears and their exploits in the early days of Texas. Caro carries the story through his impoverished early years and then his electoral struggles and finishes up with his first months as President in late 1963 - 64.

Caro's achievement so far has been extraordinary. His work has received universal praise. The Sydney Morning Herald reviewer went so far as to say it was ...... The greatest political biography ever written...... The most sweeping historical tour de force since Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire". Others contented themselves with calling it a Masterpiece of biography. Above all, it is a gripping read

Starting with the publication of the first volume in 1981, *The Path to Power*, Caro has sketched out the political and personal trajectory of a man consumed by political ambition and the quest for power, the need to bend men and events to his will. As Caro shows in Volume 1, even by his early thirties ......[Johnson] *had displayed a genius for discerning a path to power, an utter ruthlessness in destroying obstacles in that path and a seemingly bottomless capacity for deceit, deception and betrayal in moving along it.* 

However, Caro points out that the story of Lyndon Johnson is also the story of bringing electricity to the impoverished Texan Hill Country of his youth, thus alleviating much of the back breaking drudgery of women such as his own mother, who previously had to do everything by hand.

Other volumes of the biography included *Means of Ascent (1990*; and *Master of the Senate (2003)*.

Having read all 3,388 pages, I can say it is best political biography I am ever likely to read. Caro has also given us a slice of the political and social history of mid twentieth century Texas and America which illuminates America's past and present.

However, Robert Caro is now 89 years old. Are we ever going to get his final volume?


Camberwell Chorale at the Hawthorn Arts Centre: November 30
